May 1905 the American Automobile Association announced that the Racing Board would sanction a National Automobile Racing Circuit which would determine a champion for 1905.

- Entrants for the title must declare their intention of competing for the championship
- In additional to the regular sanction fee of \$10 for members, \$50 for non-members there will be an additional sanction fee of \$25
 - The \$25 additional sanction fee will be applied for the purchase of a championship car owner trophy
- Free-For-All Championship Race minimum first place prize of \$150
- Minimum race distance-5 miles
- Maximum race distance-10 miles
- Point scoring:
 - 4-Points for race win
 - 2-Points for second place finish
 - 1-Point for third place finish

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The schedule was revised to include 9/18 Syracuse, NY.*, Empire City Track (6/26) *, and Narragansett Park (9/23) * races were rescheduled.

Webb Jay and Karl Kiser were involved in career ending crashes. Paul Sartori crashed and injured a spectator. Barney Oldfield crashed at Grosse Pointe and a hand full of other drivers crashed which created headlines "Racing Cars Bolt Track; Three Hurt", "Kiser's Serious Accident Mars Day's Sport", "Webb Jay Seriously Injured At Buffalo", "Track Racing Condemned To Die", "The Doom of Track Racing", "Barney Oldfield Says That Another Year Will Witness the Demise of Track Contests" overshadowed the initial A.A.A. National Championship. There would not be another A.A.A. National Championship until 1916 (Dario Resta), the Championship was interrupted by World War 1 in 1917. The A.A.A. National Championship resumed in 1920 (Gaston Chevrolet).
