## FILES SUIT FOR TROPHY

### JACKSON CO. DEMANDS PRIZE

**LEADERS IN 300-MILE MOTOR SPEEDWAY RACE AT TIME IT WAS CALLED OFF SEEK LAW'S AID.**

The Jackson Automobile Company of Jackson, Mich., filed suit against the Motor Speedway Company, the Wheeler-Schebler Company and the Fisher Automobile Company for the possession of the \$10,000 Wheeler-Schebler trophy, which the plaintiff company contends its car won in the 300-mile race at the Speedway last Saturday. The company also asks \$100,000 damages.

The race in which the \$10,000 trophy was offered was never finished. It was called off after three accidents had occurred, in one of which three men were killed. At the time the race was stopped, however, a Jackson car, "No. 52," was ten miles ahead. It had run 235 miles when the race was called off.

The complaint alleges that the trophy is rightfully the property of the plaintiff company, but that the Speedway Company and the Wheeler-Schebler Company (the donors) have refused to turn it over. The Fisher company is made a defendant because the cup is now in the possession of this company.

#### Contends \$100,000 Damages.

The Jackson Company contends that the retention of the cup is illegal and that it has been damaged in the sum of \$100,000 by the refusal of the defendants to turn it over.

The position of the defendants in the action is that there was no race. S. B. Stevens, the referee, called the race off and declared there was no winner. It has been the intention of the Speedway Company to hold the 300-mile race at the October racing meet.

It was in this race Saturday that the National, in charge of Merz, left the track and crashed through a fence, killing Kellum, his mechanic, and two spectators.
