

# CROWDS POURING IN FOR THE BIG RACE

Railway Men Expect More Than  
Last Year if Weather  
Is Good.

## GREAT ACTIVITY AT HOTELS

Many Special Trains On Steam Roads  
and Extra Equipment On Tra-  
tion Lines—Police Plans.

Speed enthusiasts were arriving in Indianapolis from all points of the compass today. Railway traffic was heavy; the hotels are scenes of great activity; the streets were crowded; dusty travelers in dusty cars were arriving in numbers by way of everypike into the city; the honk of the horn was ever present, and the cry of the vendor of speedway souvenirs was heard on nearly every corner in the downtown district.

Some of the railway men estimated that the crowd would exceed that of last year if the weather tomorrow should be favorable. On friendly weather conditions depends the train which comes from a belt within a hundred miles or so. The indications are that the traffic from beyond the borders of Indiana will go considerably ahead of that of previous years.

### Added Equipment.

At the railway offices every quarter of an hour saw additional telegrams received, telling of added equipment that would be put on the trains into Indianapolis tonight and tomorrow morning.

The first speedway special came into the city early over the Pennsylvania lines from Pittsburgh. It was the Pittsburgh Post special, consisting of eight Pullman sleepers. At about the same time, a New York Central train brought into Indianapolis four extra Pullman sleepers, containing a speedway party from Detroit. Some of the regular trains were carrying extra equipment. Omer Fisher, station master at the Union station, said the incoming traffic was heavy during all the morning hours, and the busy throats that jangled their way through the station bore out his statement.

### Numerous Special Trains.

Nearly all the numerous special trains were scheduled to arrive after midnight tonight. Special was to follow special in rapid order into the Union station and the various passenger yards between midnight and 8 o'clock in the morning.

Among those for which arrangements had been made over the New York Central lines were two specials from Dayton, known as the National Cash Register specials, carrying about eight hundred people. The St. Louis Motor Club, between two and two hundred and fifty strong, was to come in a special, the St. Louis division. The Motor Club of Detroit had arranged for a special for more than two hundred. The Chicago Motor Club had chartered a special. The Toledo Motor Club has

### Many Machines Coming.

In addition to the big traffic from Chicago and Detroit over the railroads, these two cities will have many machines here. In Chicago an interclub reliability run between the Chicago Automobile Club and the Illinois Athletic Association is responsible for the attraction.

About six hundred automobiles, members of these two clubs, are on their way along the highways between Chicago and Indianapolis. Many members of the Wolverine Club, of Detroit, in addition to those who have taken places on the Big Four and Pennsylvania railroads, will motor to Indianapolis. Estimates of the Detroit members that there will have between five hundred and six hundred automobiles here.

for the race crowds. The Washington has fixed a price of \$5 for each person. Others charge each person the regular rate for a room, but put several persons in a room at the same rate. For instance, if the regular rate for a room is \$2 a day, the hotel puts three or four persons in the room for \$2 each. If the room is a \$5 room, four persons are put in it at \$5 each.

### Arrangements For Cots.

The hotel managers said today they were expecting the speedway crowd to be as large this year as last year, if not larger. All of the hotels made arrangements to place cots in hallways, assembly rooms and sample rooms and to utilize every available foot of space for this purpose.

All reservations of rooms made at hotels have been for two days. None of the hotels has accepted any reservation order for less than two days, beginning today.

The Claypool housed more than one thousand one hundred guests the night before the speedway races last year, and it was expecting to do as well or better tonight.

The speedway room bureau will house thousands of visitors. Hundreds of homes with reasonable rates have been thrown open to the bureau. Last year thousands of visitors found themselves almost without shelter because they did not know of the bureau. This year the speedway company has advertised the bureau in many cities and it is thought the visitors will take advantage of the offers of accommodations.
